Review of Pupil Premium Report 2016-17

Introduction

What is the Pupil Premium Grant?

The Pupil Premium Grant is additional funding given to publicly-funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and to close the gap between them and their peers.

The funding is available to both mainstream and non-mainstream schools such as special schools and pupil referral units.

Who is the Pupil Premium Grant for?

The Pupil Premium is primarily aimed at Reception to Year 11 pupils who are from low-income families and are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) or who have been registered for FSM at any point in the past six years.

How much is the Pupil Premium Grant Currently?

For the 2016-17 financial year, the allocation is as follows:

- 1. £1,320 per child currently eligible for FSM or who has been registered for FSM in the past six years
- 2. £300 per child who has a parent in the armed forces

Schools will also receive £1,900 for each looked-after pupil who:

- 3. Has been looked after from one day or more
- 4. Was adopted from care on or after 30 December 2005 or left care under a Special Guardian Order or a Residence Order

Our pupils performed significantly above National Standards overall with an Average Scaled Score of 114.0 (FFT & ROL 2017) as against the national average which was 104. This placed us in the top FFT ranking of #1% in the country.	98% of pupils overall attained an average scaled score of 110 or higher in reading, writing and maths against National which was approximately 61% again placing us in the top ranking of #1.
